

PENDLETON JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW AND SALE RULES

(To be held the Friday and Saturday following Round-Up)

1. **ELIGIBILITY:** The exhibitor's previous year's grades in school will determine program eligibility (4-H/FFA) and the divisions for showmanship. Any Umatilla County 4-H or FFA member, in good standing, as certified by their club leader or instructor, regularly enrolled in a market livestock project and who shall have owned and had in their possession and care, a steer from **March 12**, a lamb from **July 10** or a swine from **July 10**, may offer such animal for sale at this auction. There is no maximum pre-show weight for steers, sheep or swine. Members must be enrolled in the project in which they will show prior to **June 1**. Consignments to sale must be individually owned. All animals must be ear-tagged on the specified dates to show and sell.
2. **ENTRY FORMS FOR LIVESTOCK:** All livestock will be entered through the exhibitor registrations, due the last Friday of August. The Show Board will use the weigh-in form information to plan pen construction and make pen assignments. **A clean animal certificate is due at the final weigh-in before the animal crosses the scale. Steers must have a transfer of ownership form (E-slip).**
3. **WEIGHING:** On the Friday of the show, all animals will be weighed between 4:00-8:00 pm. All livestock must arrive prior to 8:00 pm. For animals that do not make weight, one re-weigh is permitted, immediately following the first weigh. The eligibility weight will be the unshrunk weight across the scale. Sale weights will be determined by subtracting a 3% pencil shrink on all livestock. **ALL ANIMALS MUST BE CLEAN AND ALL EAR TAGS MUST BE READABLE PRIOR TO PRESENTING THE ANIMAL FOR WEIGHING.** Any problems or questions concerning ear tags, weights, or ownership must be directed to the Extension office or the show board immediately. All steers must be haltered at all weigh-ins. **All animals will be inspected by a veterinarian prior to being offloaded from trailers.**
4. All animals are subject to inspection by the veterinarian in attendance upon admission to the grounds. No animal shall be admitted to or allowed to remain on the grounds that shows evidence of infection, contagious disease, or any unsightly disease condition such as warts, ringworm, club lamb fungus, prolapse, etc. The management reserves the right to require health inspection, diagnostic tests, treatment and/or disease control measures or procedures which become necessary in emergencies, at the owners expense. Animals NOT passing health inspection by the veterinarian must be immediately removed from the grounds.
5. **WEIGHT AND AGE REQUIREMENTS:** **Maximum age on steers -- All steers will not be older than 18 months. Steers must weigh 1,050 lbs. minimum. Hogs must weigh between 230 lbs. minimum and 290 lbs. maximum. Lambs must weigh 100 lbs. or less at weigh-in and weigh between 105 lbs. Minimum and 160 lbs. maximum at show time. No UCF tagged lambs will be accepted unless tagged for PJLS at the PJLS weigh-in. All market lambs must be less than 9 months old, and have lamb teeth.**
6. **SPECIAL REOUIREMENTS:** **BEEF** - No dairy, dairy crossbreds, beef heifers or spayed females are eligible to be shown or sold through the auction. **LAMBS** may be either ewe or wether lambs. Short scrotum bucks, or natural or induced cryptorchids will be disqualified. **SWINE** may be either gilts or barrows. Cryptorchids will be disqualified.
7. **GRADING AND SIFTING:** Grading will be done at the time stock is judged and on the basis of market grades. Choice or better steers to receive blue ribbons, Select steers to receive red ribbons, and Standard steers to receive white ribbons. Desirable Choice lambs will receive blue ribbons, less desirable Choice lambs will receive red ribbons, and Good lambs will receive white ribbons. Ribbons on hogs will be awarded as follows: #1 and #2 - Blue; #3 - Red; and #4 - White. **White ribbon animals are not eligible for the sale.** Exhibitors must remove white ribbon animals from the premises by the end of the sale.
8. **LIVESTOCK AUCTION:** All market stock must be sold at the livestock auction. There will be no pre-purchase of animals and no resale of animals at floor price. Animals judged best will be sold first and animals of each grade will be sold in the order placed when judged. **(A FEE OF FOUR PERCENT (4%) OF THE SALE PRICE WILL BE DEDUCTED FROM THE PROCEEDS OF EACH SALE TO HELP DEFRAY EXPENSES.)** Each exhibitor may consign and sell one entry only. No checks will be released to the sellers until adequate funds from buyers have been received by the Board.
9. **RESALES:** No animal, once sold at the auction at this sale may be re-sold at this or any other youth auction, but purchasers wishing to donate their purchase to any cause may direct the sale committee to sell such purchase and disburse the proceeds as directed.

10. **RESPONSIBILITY OF OWNER:** The FFA or 4-H member owning an animal being exhibited must attend the show and handle their own animal during all phases of the show and sale. The owner and/or representation must be present whenever the animals are processed, including weighing. The owner must be present for showing, and selling. Exceptions to this rule will be considered only if requested in writing. Please submit to the Board President. If an exhibitor cannot be present at the weighing, someone should be present to represent every club and chapter. It is important to be able to identify all animals when weighed.

The show committee will do everything to assure a smooth-running show, but emphasize that the exhibitor is responsible to see that their animal is not over-looked in any phase of the show.

Transfer of ownership takes place at the time of sale, but the exhibitor must feed and water animals through Saturday evening. If an animal is rejected, condemned or discounted (because of disease, prior injury, etc.) the final buyer would have the option of accepting the floor price of the animal or a comparable worth in meat. The 4-H or FFA seller would assume this loss.

Thank You Notes to Buyers (NEW IN 2015) 4-H and FFA youth participating in the livestock auction will be required to write "Thank-You" notes to the buyer(s) of their animal as well as to any additional supporters who "added on" to the sale of their animal.

- a. A letter will be mailed to each exhibitor by October 10th showing the names and addresses of buyers, and add-on supporters and a bump amount if any.
- b. UNSEALED Thank you notes (properly addressed, postage paid) may be turned in during the sale. (Cards will be available at the sale.)
- c. UNSEALED Thank you notes (properly addressed, postage paid) can be dropped off at your local extension office or mailed in a larger envelop to PJLS at PO Box 100, Pendleton, Or. 97801.
- d. Buyer gifts and /or Thank You notes given at the sale are permitted, but **do not** eliminate the requirement to mail Thank You notes. (Many times the person at the auction is not the actual buyer or business owner.)
- e. The PJLS Board will keep track of Thank You notes and put them in the mail. Any "unapproved notes" will have to be resubmitted.
- f. Thank You notes must be received before checks are issued.
- g. Checks will NOT be mailed to exhibitors until Thank You notes have been received by PJLS board.
- h. 4-H clubs and FFA chapters are highly encouraged to send a group Thank You to all of the contributors to the bump program. A list of bump contributors will be available at the Pendleton extension office one week after the sale.

The PJLS Board fully supports the following: National Beef Check Off, National Pork Board, and American Lamb Board, assessments will be collected and remitted to the appropriate program as required.

11. All animals must be properly fitted for conformation and showmanship classes. **ALL ANIMALS SHALL BE FITTED BY THE EXHIBITOR.** All animals must remain in the exhibit area for the duration of the show.
12. LAMBS--
- a. **Lambs must be slick shorn prior to the final weigh-in.**
 - b. Scrapie Eradication Identification tags will be required on ALL lambs.
13. STEERS--
- a. Steers must be de-horned, no scurs longer than 2" at show time.
 - b. Beef exhibitors must provide transportation slip. Bill of sale and brand inspection (T-Slips) are required at the time of arrival, if the exhibitor is not the original owner.
 - c. Exhibitors unable to control their steer will not be allowed to show or sell through the auction. Such animals will be sent home. No aids such as nose tongs, blindfolds or tranquilizers may be used during showing or selling.
14. SWINE--
- a. **No shaved hog bodies.** Body clipping, (to no less than ½ inch packer standards) ears and tail shaving is optional. Body shaved hogs will be sent home.
 - b. No oils on hog bodies.
15. Animals must be off all medication, additives, and implants by proper withdrawal time. Exhibitors and their parents must certify that animals have met these requirements. The clean animal certificate and country of origin labeling forms are due at the final weigh-in before the animal crosses the scale.
16. There will be a mandatory **JUDGING CONTEST** for all FFA and 4-H members. All FFA and 4-H members must give oral reasons. The show committee will determine classes. Livestock entered in the show must be made available for the judging contest upon request.

17. Livestock exhibited and sold at another youth livestock auction show and sale are not eligible to be shown at the Pendleton Junior Livestock Show.
18. The only dogs allowed on the show grounds would be those used as service dogs.
19. The Board MAY limit the number of animals to be shown to those making sale weight only. Underweight and overweight animals may be turned away at the scales.
20. Appeals should be given in writing to the show President, who will present it to the Show Board. All decisions made by the Board are final.
21. HARDSHIPS: The Board will consider hardship cases with a letter from a vet, a leader, the child and the parents stating the mishap.
22. **No alcohol, tobacco, or illegal drug use allowed on the show grounds!!!**

REQUIREMENTS

1. Each exhibitor shall furnish the necessary feed and feeding equipment, and shall be responsible for the care of their animal.
2. Each exhibitor shall have prepared their animal for the show and shall do likewise during the show. **ALL ANIMALS SHALL BE FITTED BY THE EXHIBITOR.**
3. All animals must be clean and fitted for conformation, showmanship and for the sale.
4. Stalls, pens and animals are to be kept clean at all times.
5. Each exhibitor is responsible to see that their animal is shown in the proper class and that their animal gets into the judging arena promptly when their class is called.
6. Exhibitors of steers are responsible to see that a good rope halter is provided for their animal and that such animal is left in its stall following the auction. Every effort will be made to return labeled halters.
7. All animals will be shown and classified according to weight.
8. Sifted animals may be retained, if desired, by the exhibitor and fed out for home use or later sale, or can be sold by private treaty. **No "for sale" signs may be posted.**
9. Sifted animals may participate in showmanship contests only, and are not eligible for the sale. Animals must be removed immediately following showmanship and prior to the all-around contests.

ANY PERSON BREAKING THE SHOW RULES WILL BE ASKED TO LEAVE THE SHOW IF THE LAMB, BEEF OR SWINE SUPERINTENDENT THINKS IT IS NECESSARY. THE SHOW BOARD WILL BACK THE SUPERINTENDENTS.

THE PENDLETON JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW BOARD OF DIRECTORS RESERVES THE RIGHT TO INTERPRET ALL REGULATIONS AND RULES, AND TO SETTLE ALL DISPUTES. ALL DECISIONS OF THE BOARD ARE FINAL.
